The program for the evening was a sharpening demo and a tool sale, along with Show and Tell. The items for the display for October at the State Library in Trenton were also packed. More on that later.

Hal Ottenstein demo'd a Wolverine type sharpening jig. This puts a beautiful finger nail grind on bowl

and spindle gouges. It also allows very quick touch ups while turning.



Gil Malave brought his Tormak and showed it's use. The machine puts a real polish on a gouge. Sharp enough to cut from across the room.

There are several jigs for the Tormak that pertain to wood turning, and Gil has most of them.

He also demo'd a floppy sanding disk type sharpener.



This one seemed like it would be great for the in between touch ups while turning a tough piece of wood. Quick, easy, and no jigs necessary

The Tool Sale went very well. The club realized over \$800.00 from it's share of the proceeds. Bill Borkowski's Store did it's usual landslide business.

Wood of the Month:

Name	Sassafras (<i>sassafras albidum</i>)
Type	Hardwood.
Other Names	Also known as red sassafras, saxifrax, and cinnamon wood.
Sources	Grows in Ontario and eastern half of United States.
Appearance	Straight, coarse grained with coarse texture and medium luster. Yellowish white sapwood and pale brown heartwood, deepening to dull orange-brown with exposure. Resembles black ash.
Physical Props	Somewhat light, soft, brittle, and relatively weak, with good decay resistance and dimensional stability in use.
Working Props	Works well with machine or hand tools. Pre-drilling recommended for screws and nails. Glues, stains, and finishes satisfactorily.
Uses	Used for inexpensive furniture, boxes, crates, small boats, fenceposts (due to decay resistance), rails, cooperage, and general millwork.
Comments	Most sassafras trees are too small to yield significant quantities of lumber.
